



KEY FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS



Key financial highlights for 2022 are as follows:

The assets of the County plus deferred outflows of resources exceeded its liabilities plus deferred inflows of resources at the close of the year ended December 31, 2022, by \$656,494,118 (net position).

The County's total net position increased \$91,069,982.

Net position related to governmental activities increased \$85,088,279, which represents an increase of 21.9 percent from 2021.

Net position related to business-type activities increased \$5,981,703 which represents an increase of 3.4 percent from 2021.

For governmental activities, general revenues accounted for \$243,312,781 or 46.1 percent of all revenues.

Program specific revenues in the form of charges for services, operating grants and contributions, and capital grants and contributions accounted for \$284,176,980 or 53.9 percent of total revenues of \$527,489,761.

KEY FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS



The County had \$438,651,482 in expenses related to governmental activities; only \$284,176,980 of these expenses were offset by program specific charges for services, operating grants and contributions and capital grants and contributions.

Seneral revenues (primarily taxes) of \$243,312,781 were adequate to provide for these programs by \$85,088,279.

Among major funds, the General Fund had \$138,492,173 in revenues and \$120,227,964 in expenditures.

The General Fund's fund balance decreased to \$63,457,630, a decrease of \$14,042,758 from 2021. The County's total debt increased \$45,929,054 during the current year.



SOCIAL CAPITAL

In this year's budget, Mayor Horrigan placed a high priority on enhancing neighborhood infrastructure. He emphasized the need for local government to invest in essential services and infrastructure, like improved roads, community centers, parks, and efficient Fire, Police, and EMS facilities. The Mayor stressed his strong commitment to all Akron residents and the importance of responsive government institutions that use public funds to create healthier, safer, and more equitable communities.

Notable features of the 2022 City of Akron Capital Budget include:

- 1. The largest annual resurfacing program in Akron's history, allocating \$13,932,646 for the paving of approximately 75 miles of roads throughout the city.
- 2.Close to \$1 million designated for the restoration of heavily damaged concrete streets in Akron.
- 3. A comprehensive evaluation of the city's pools to plan for significant investments.
- 4. Assessment of existing community centers to initiate a reinvestment program, starting with the Ed Davis, Reservoir Park, and Patterson Park centers.
- 5.A \$7.5 million investment in updated equipment for Public Service and Public Safety, covering a range of essential vehicles and machinery.
- 6.Replacement of approximately 500 remaining lead service lines to ensure safe drinking water.
- 7. Upgrades to the water system, including the replacement of water meters with advanced technology to give residents more control over water usage and billing.
- 8.Enhancements to Lock 3 and Summit Lake public spaces, following the Lock 3 Vision Plan, to create more accessible and engaging spaces for residents and visitors.
- 9.Investment of \$3 million in public-space infrastructure around Summit Lake, including the construction of the Ohio and Erie Canalway Summit Lake Connector Trail.
- 10. The completion of Firestone Business Park, providing land for job creation and economic investment.
- 11. Over \$2.3 million allocated for homelessness prevention and housing assistance, with an additional \$1.5 million for emergency shelters to address urgent needs after the COVID-19 pandemic.



FINANCIAL CAPITAL

The concept of "Financial Capital" is introduced as a crucial element within the economic dimension of the public sector.

In a press release from the City of Akron dated February 15, 2022, the 2022 Capital Budget is highlighted. This budget underscores Mayor Dan Horrigan's commitment to promoting healthy, safe, and vibrant neighborhoods, with a historic allocation of \$25 million for parks and community centers—the largest ever in Akron's history.

The capital budget focuses on investments in the city's physical infrastructure, with a total of \$366.8 million in new investments. These investments encompass areas like public safety, transportation, housing, and quality of life.

The budget includes a significant amount of state and federal funding, as well as local funds, including money generated from a Safety and Streets income tax increase passed in 2017.

Key highlights of the 2022 City of Akron Capital Budget include substantial investments in parks and community centers, renovations and improvements to public spaces, efforts to replace lead service lines for safe drinking water, homelessness prevention, public service and safety equipment, and neighborhood revitalization and sustainability initiatives. This budget is made possible through the efficient use of local, state, and federal funds, including the American Rescue Plan Act monies, enabling a focus on Akron's recovery and future growth.



WELL BEING INDICATORS

The well-being indicators of Akron, as assessed through rankings and metrics, reflect the city's commitment to providing a high quality of life and a strong sense of community well-being. These indicators encompass factors such as healthcare access, education, economic opportunity, and overall living conditions. WELL BEING INDICATORS

2022 Summit County Community Pulse Report

The 2022 Summit County Community Pulse Report, conducted by the Center for Marketing and Opinion Research (CMOR), highlights significant differences in opinions between Akron residents and suburban Summit County residents:

- 1. Direction of Summit County: 51% of Akron residents view the county positively, while 68% of suburban residents share this sentiment.
- 2. Quality of Life Indicators: Suburban residents generally have more favorable views on healthcare services, affordable housing, and local police performance compared to Akron residents.
- 3. Satisfaction with Living in Summit County: 74% of suburban residents are satisfied with living in Summit County, while only 47% of Akron residents express the same satisfaction.
- 4. Intent to Stay: 87% of suburban residents plan to stay in the area for the next two years, in contrast to 74% of Akron residents.
- 5. Most Important Problem: Crime and safety concerns are the top priority, with 30% of respondents highlighting this issue.

Demographics: The survey included 800 respondents, with 315 identifying as Akron residents. The majority were in the 45-64 age range, female, white, registered voters, and Democrats. Data Collection: The survey was conducted through various interview methods.

These findings call for attention from community leaders to address quality of life disparities and safety concerns, with a focus on improving overall satisfaction for all residents in Summit County.
